GUEST SPEAKER

Dr Hannes Meyer spoke to us as an accredited Skin Doctor

Over summer, residents in our part of the world are exposed to 40% higher level of radiation than other countries at a similar latitude. Factors in play are, there is less pollution and cloud cover. Hence a higher prevalence of skin cancers

Of the 930,000+ affected only around 500 will die. So, it is largely TREATABLE.

Dr Hannes explained how the skin functions as a wall. Once UV radiation damages the skin, protection begins to fail. The level of damage depends on many factors. For more detailed information go to Dermet.NZ

In every case both protection and treatment are key. It is advisable to have at least one full body scan per lifetime. More if you are susceptible

USE 50+ sunblock, as it provides the best barrier. This can be provided by your doctor through PRESCRIPTION Seek shade, wear a hat, cover, avoid long spells outdoors in summer 10am to 4pm

SELF CHECK look/feel for rough patches rather like sandpaper. This is the easiest precancer to treat if caught early.

EFG If a mark/s on your skin is elevated, firm to the touch, growing rapidly and changing within a month seek MEDICAL ADVICE. Note it may not bleed or have colour so don't be fooled.

Refer to the leaflet Scan Your Skin

RISK FACTORS to look out for. Prior diagnoses, 100+ moles, family history, skin type, sun exposure-especially long term, sunbed use, immune suppression, medication (check with your doctor)

BE SUNSMART, SELF CHECK, DON'T DELAY, FOLLOWUP

Five Minute Speaker Brien Mahoney

Brien has come to the club with 50 years of experience as a Chartered Accountant, working for a Trust Company. He also has fifty years under his belt in Rotary. In that time Brien has served in Finance for the Pathways Trust for 20 years; and been with the Outward - Bound Trust for 36 years. The Napier Club Charitable Trust consists of two branches - one general and one specifically for Outward Bound. Brien's interest began when he took a course in 1966. Then he became an active supporter through the Palmerston North Rotary branch in 1988.

The Rotary Club of Napier Charitable Trust for Outward bound has supported the Kaweka Program which enables 14 students from low decile schools to attend at a cost of \$70.000 PA Brien and friends raise most of this sum and top it up from income generated by the Trust. An amazing contribution to our youth.
