GUEST SPEAKER Big Brother Big Sister BBBS Bonnie Gardiner and Mentor Ben gave us an engaging update on their program. It is the largest mentor training organisation in the world.

Bonnie told us that our recent donation allowed the team to undertake on-line and workshop training to maintain safety for children. This is of paramount importance to the organisation. In addition, it has contributed to mentor/mentee activities and events. The Napier branch currently has 76 matches with 9 in process and a waiting list of 46. Mentees graduate at age 18 or earlier due to circumstance.

The data shows mentoring works. Families report improvement in decision making, academic performance, confidence, trust in relationships and improved attitude to school by 70-91%

Mentees are largely from single parent families or Grandparents raising grandchildren. School, Police, and social organisations make referrals for a variety of reasons. BBBS maintains close relationships with the above as well as many other groups such as Family Centre, Grandparents raising Grandchildren, Pregnancy Help and Social workers.

Combined match events are held throughout the year such as to Velocity, Airport, Police dog handler with dog, The penguins at the port, and Chipmunks making community connections. Bonnie thanked us for our support.

Dave explained he had a rigorous interview process and police check to ascertain suitability and develop a profile to find the best match. With his family now grown he wanted to give back and be involved in the community. Arrangements are made by the mentee family and Dave meets his match weekly for 1-3 hours While new to BBBS he is already finding it rewarding and developing a happy relationship with his mentee.

5 MINUTE SPEAKER Alan Day

Born Napier Sep 40 one year after start of 2nd WW.

Grew up in the new suburb of Marewa and went to Marewa school starting days after VJ Day. Then on to Napier Intermediate and to Napier Boys High School for four years.

First job was with The Guardian Trust in Herschell Street, as office junior, then cashier, then accounts clerk.

Joined the Army Territorials July 60. After basic training trained in general and personnel administration, movement of personnel and freight in and out of South East Asia, finance and pay both in NZ and in South East Asia in the days before computerisation.

In the 1960's I spent 3 yrs in Waiouru, (was on NSTU staff when Gary won the ballot), 4 yrs in Singapore, 1 yr in South Vietnam and 2 yrs in Wellington living at Fort Dorset and working in the city.

In the 70's I spent 1 yr in Wellington, 2 years married accompanied in Singapore, 4 yrs in Papakura and 3 yrs in Burnham Camp living in Christchurch.

The 80's were spent entirely in Burnham and Christchurch and retired in 1989 and joined the civil staff responsible for financial accounting and civil staff administration.

In Nov 2014 moved back to my hometown, Napier after 54 yrs.

Events during these years, besides getting married in 1973 that stand out in my memories are:

My time at the *Army's Club Med location at Waiouru*, whilst the Ruapehu backdrop is a grand sight on a nice day, (and there's not always a lot of them), they say the best view of Waiouru is in the rear vision mirror.

My years in Singapore which I loved.

Being at Fort Dorset on 10 Apr 68 in the Wahine storm.

The year 1969 in Saigon city during the Vietnam War.

Four months in London in late summer/autumn of 1976 working in the Defence Liaison Staff at the NZ High Commission looking after the NZ contingent on an exchange exercise with British units in UK and Germany.

In a small way assisting with the administration of the *Bouganville peace* talks in Burnham in mid winter 1997.

With my wife attending a *luncheon with the Queen* and Prince Philip on her visit to Burnham Camp in 2002.

Living through the Christchurch earthquakes of 2010 and 2011.

Playing rugby in Napier, Taihape sub union, Singapore, Hong Kong.

Eight years in the 1980's as secretary of the Merivale Papanui Rugby Football Club & *Eighteen years as secretary* of the Cantabrian Rugby Football Club in Christchurch.

Eight years on the Trust set up in 2012 to support service personnel wounded in Afghanistan and their families and families of those personnel killed in that campaign.

Five years on the Trust set up in 2019 to write the history of the RNZAC and its predecessor units culminating in the launch of the book earlier this year.

Now time to properly retire.

We all think Alan must have lived an extra life or two!!!
