## GUEST SPEAKER

As a musician Ella delighted with a waiata to introduce her presentation. Her own musical background includes playing jazz on both clarinet and saxophone. She completed a degree in musical therapy in 2008 and set up a music program in Kampala, Uganda for war affected Ugandans. In 2019 Ella saw a position advertised in NZ but didn't make it till 2021 because of covid. Matt originally dreamed of a future in psychology but then shifted to music which grew to a qualification in music therapy. His uncle waxed lyrical about living in Tolaga Bay, so Matt made his way to NZ and so far, has not been disappointed. From a video we learned music therapy helps those who struggle to speak and move. With music therapy, participants learn to call and respond, make decisions, develop connections/trust and express themselves freely. Anyone from infancy to elder years can benefit. Benefits include wellbeing, socialisation, enhanced communication, motor skills development, sensory experiences,

language growth, redirecting emotions in a healthy manner, managing mood change and even physiological benefits such as pain management.

The Raukatauri Music Trust was set up by Dame Hinewehi Mohi in March 2004 named after her daughter who was the first participant. Ella told us the meaning refers to a Maori legend of Goddess of flute music who loved her flute so much she turned herself into a case moth so she would never be away from it. The moth is trapped in its case just as Rautakauri is trapped in her body.

While music therapy has been widely used in Europe, USA, UK and Australia, it is relatively new but growing in NZ with four centres in NZ supporting 1000 clients. In 2018 only one therapist was working in Hawkes Bay. Now we work out of two centres with two full time qualified therapists, one part time and two volunteers.

We now run sessions out of Taikura House. Thanks to the donation from your club, we have been able to maintain sessions on Friday from the Tamatea High School music suite.

The team in Hawkes Bay strive to provide quality service designed for and in response to each individual recognising each one's worth and inborn response to music. This can be in the form of voice, instrument or movement as the therapist and client actively engage. While referrals can be due to a wide range of diagnosis, a diagnosis is not necessary to participate. Referrals come from many professionals and groups in the community and can be a self-referral.

Without Government support finance comes from donations, fundraising, grants and client payment. This is on a sliding scale depending on circumstances ranging from \$65-\$120 per session although the actual cost is higher than this, so all contributions are gratefully received and appreciated.
